

Music	Similarly to last week, this week we will be returning to another of the concepts we have looked at previously, but within a rock context, that is the basic building blocks of riffs and chords.
	First of all, please listen to the Guns N' Roses track <i>Sweet Child O' Mine</i> . As you may notice, the intro is very long, and there are no vocals for its entirety. Instead, the melody is taken up by another instrument. Which is it?
	This instrument plays the main <i>riff</i> of the piece, which returns periodically throughout the song. A riff is a short melody that is repeated over and over again, often as a way of creating a <i>hook</i> that isn't found in the vocals, that the listener will clearly be able to remember. Listen to the next few songs and see if you can identify the riffs Song A: Rage Against the Machine – <i>Bombtrack</i> (swearing around 1:20) Song B: Bon Jovi – <i>Livin' On A Prayer</i> Song C: Arctic Monkeys – <i>Brianstorm</i>






But guitars don't just play riffs, they play chords too. To understand what guitar guitars are doing when they play these chords, we have to remember back to the autumn term. Below is a diagram of how to form major and minor chords on a piano. You can see that there are three different notes in each chord: notes 1, 3, & 5. In a C major chord these notes are C, E and G respectively.



When a guitarist plays a C major chord, he ensures that every string he plays is either a C, E or G. The same goes for every other chord he might want to play. How would you write this on a stave? Use your folders and/or previous worksheets to help you answer.



Now, one thing we've briefly mentioned in lessons already is the power chord. Power chords are simpler than the triads above, because they only include notes 1 and 5. So a C power chord contains only the notes C and G. Write it below.

Week 2

One of the most typical things about rock music is its heavy focus on the guitar. As we heard last week when we were looking at riffs, the guitar is very front-and-centre in the typical rock band, and might be considered the most important instrument.

Today then, we'll be looking at the guitar in all of its different aspects. To start us off, let's watch some guitar *virtuosi* (masters), and see what kind of techniques and styles we see being used in rock music.



https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=PjZiCo02HxU DO NOT BE FOOLED BY THIS VIDEO'S TITLE! These are beginners and they will get (and probably already have gotten) better! But you can see what is important to guitar playing from these players: technique, knowledge of the instrument and experience.



Above is a diagram of a typical electric guitar. The three most easy-to-remember parts of the guitar are the **body**, the **neck** and the **head**. Think of the guitar as a person without arms or legs and you might get the idea.

The guitar has **six** strings, as you can see in the diagram below, and each of them has a note name from A-G. One easy way to remember the order of these note names is through the mnemonic "Every And Donkeys Grow Big Ears", which you may remember.





The other numbers (1st, 2nd, etc.) refer to the **frets**, which are the vertical lines which cross the neck. These are where you put your fingers to create different notes. Using the diagram above, guitarists can work out how to play different things. So, for example:

E A D G B E



In this diagram, we are told to put our fingers on the A and D strings in the 2^{nd} fret. (The numbers in the circles tell us which fingers to use.) This chord is called an E minor – see if you can play it if you have a guitar to hand.

We will look at the guitar again, so remember this!
